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Introduction

The Feminist Foundation for African Contemporary Art (FFACA) was established on March 23, 2023.

In line with its statutes, the Foundation's primary objective is to promote and support contemporary women artists of African descent, acknowledging that women artists, particularly women artists of colour, have been historically underrepresented in both private and public collections.

Furthermore, the Foundation aims to highlight contemporary African art as a rich and innovative artistic expression, striving to move beyond reductive lenses inherited from colonial perspectives that have long influenced the perception of African creativity.

The Foundation primarily achieves its objectives through temporary exhibitions at Gallery Brulhart (21 Rue des Vollandes, 1207 Geneva) which also houses its office and administrative premises.

This annual report covers the calendar year 2024, from January 1 to December 31, 2024.

In line with our commitment to artistic creation and intercultural dialogue, the year 2024 was marked by a rich and diverse program.

We presented four exhibitions featuring artists from the Democratic Republic of Congo, Rwanda, Burkina Faso, and Nigeria, each offering a unique perspective on contemporary cultural and social issues. Each exhibition showcased women's perspectives on current views of history, family and community relationships, gender identities, and the quest for personal fulfillment.

Our events included film screenings, artistic performances, and panel discussions that fostered a wide range of meaningful exchanges.


Our second consecutive participation in the AKAA fair was an opportunity to increase the gallery's visibility while strengthening our network within the international art ecosystem.

Finally, our partnerships with organisations such as Phenomenal Women Global, Un Soir aux Eaux-Vives, and the Global Fund illustrate our commitment to collaborating with initiatives that share our values of creativity, inclusion, and social impact.

Bois de Boulogne (25 January - 28 March 2024)

In this exhibition, Willys Kezi Niangi shares her personal impressions of trans* people and sex workers of the Bois de Boulogne in Paris. Although Niangi's artistic practice is often influenced by her own experiences and personal history, this time, with **Bois de Boulogne**, she chose to address a topic that did not directly concern her.

The artist's works evoked mixed emotions: curiosity, surprise, empathy, and sometimes even anger, among the diverse audience that visited the exhibition

Fierce Femmes (18 April - 4 July 2024)

From the heart of the dynamic Rwandan art scene, the **Fierce Femmes** exhibition reflects the spirit of resistance and the multifaceted identities of Rwandan women. Dr Ceri Chillier-Whatley is the instigator of the project, which is part of the commemoration of the 30th anniversary of the Tutsi genocide in Rwanda. She facilitated the connection between Gallery Brulhart and Kakizi Jemima, a multidisciplinary artist and Rwandan curator, who served as the exhibition's curator.

Five artists are at the core of this project: Odile Uwera, Cynthia Butare, Teta Chel, Crista Uwase, and Miziguruka. Through various mediums — digital drawing, documentary photography, painting, collage, and videographic performance — they each convey their unique vision of the contemporary Rwandan woman, through an immersive experience that challenges preconceived notions and sparks curiosity.

Fierce Femmes (18 avril - 4 juillet 2024)

The **Fierce Femmes** project was realised with the support of the *Fonds Culturel Sud* and received extensive media coverage. A guided tour by curator Kakizi Jemima took place on 20 April, and the artist duo Miziguruka & Binghi gave a performance on 30 May, as part of the *Un Soir aux Eaux-Vives* event.

Fierce Femmes was also the focus of two other special events, in collaboration with the Global Fund and the Embassy of Rwanda in Switzerland, respectively (details can be found in the Events section). With nearly 600 visitors throughout its duration, **Fierce Femmes** was the most visited exhibition of 2024.

Filiations (29 August - 18 October 2024)

Through her deliberately blurred lens, Olga Yaméogo reveals her subjects – often friends or family members - emphasising movement rather than a moment fixed in time. The exhibition title, **Filiations**, alludes to concepts of legitimacy in the connections between humans and land, as explored in the work of Édouard Glissant. The shimmering, fuzzy logic of Yaméogo's paintings celebrates fluctuating definitions of identity and the quivering of the world.






Défier l'ombre (1 November - 22 December 2024)

Through the **Défier l'Ombre** exhibition, two artists engage in a thought-provoking conversation around identity issues, shaped by ever-evolving societies. Their works confront contemporary tensions and paradoxes while reviving the echoes of a past often relegated to oblivion.

Aza Mansongi's canvases pulse with boundless energy, where each brushstroke seems to capture a facet of contemporary life. Through her embroidered portraits presenting complex and irreducible identities, Folake Idowu invites an intimate and direct reflection on the representation of Black women.

Art Fairs

AKAA 2024 (18 - 20 October 2024)

For our second participation in the *Also Known As Africa* (AKAA) fair, we presented the work of Philiswa Lila, a visual artist and researcher whose practice explores memory, identity, and personal narratives. Her installation **Keep Out of Reach of Children** (the same title as her 2023 exhibition at Gallery Brulhart) addresses themes of safety by combining beads, found objects, performance, and video. Through her art, she examines how violence becomes normalised in certain environments while uncovering the layered history of people, places, and objects.







Just like in the previous edition, the AKAA fair remains an essential meeting point for connecting with artists, curators, collectors, and gallerists, thus enriching our network and perspectives.

Publications

Our various exhibitions received extensive media coverage throughout 2024. Notable features include:

- An article on the Bois de Boulogne exhibition in l'Art À Genève
- An interview with Kakizi Jemima and Cynthia Butare on Radio Cité Genève
- A special report, Rwanda: une renaissance artistique on France 24
- An article on the Fierce Femmes exhibition in the newspaper Newtimes
- An interview with Olga Yaméogo on Radio Cité Genève

Catalogues for all exhibitions were produced and made available to the public. Curatorial texts featured contributions from Rosie Cook (who also handled all graphic design), Jemima Kakizi, and Samia Tawil.

Our social media presence grew steadily, thanks to the combined efforts of our team. In 2024, the *@gallerybrulhart* Instagram account saw a 34% increase in followers, rising from 1,204 to 1,614. Numerous posts, reels, and stories documented exhibitions, events, and other gallery activities, amassing over 50,000 views. The number of subscribers to the Brulhart Gallery newsletter also increased by 6%, from 541 to 583.

Collaborations

Collaborating with various organisations allows FFACA to expand its reach and support local initiatives that align with its objectives.

Phenomenal Women Global (PWG) is a nonprofit organisation based in Switzerland and Uganda, dedicated to connecting, advancing, and empowering women and girls by supporting their personal and professional development, enhancing their leadership skills, guiding them, and providing mentorship. FFCAA | Gallery Brulhart is proud to be a member of the Phenomenal Women Global network. We participated in a webinar on the occasion of International Women's Rights Day on March 8. We were also present with a stand at PWG's annual conference. Members of the organisation regularly support and attend the gallery's openings and other events.

The association **Un Soir aux Eaux-Vives** brings together around twenty art galleries, artist studios, and other artistic spaces in the Eaux-Vives district. Each year, it organises an open gallery night, which typically attracts around 200 visitors. Gallery Brulhart has been participating since 2022.

The **Global Fund** is an international funding and partnership organization committed to fighting deadly infectious diseases, addressing the injustices that fuel them, and strengthening health systems and pandemic preparedness in over a hundred countries. As part of its internal events, the organisation celebrates Africa Day each year, in which Gallery Brulhart took part in 2024.

As part of Swiss cultural cooperation, the **Fonds Culturel Sud** supports productions and events involving artists from Africa, Asia, Latin America, and Eastern Europe (non-EU countries). In 2024, Gallery Brulhart received support from the Fonds Culturel Sud for the realisation of the Fierce Femmes project.
